Thank You for Making Recycling A Success in Clinton!

Dear City of Clinton Residents,

The Solid Waste Department is writing to all of you to say, "Thank you," for all of your efforts for making recycling a priority in your home every day. For several years, the same conversation was brought up about how to make our recycling program more viable. The answer rested in making the recycling program user friendly with one cart. Single - Stream recycling started on October 2, 2017 in Clinton. The first month of recycling increased by 33 tons. The solid waste collected for the first month decreased by 22 tons. As our program has completed the first year, we have recycled a total of

981 tons of recycling. This is 517 more tons than the year before! How did we do on the reduction of waste for the first year? A reduction of 426 tons were reduced from going to the landfill!!

There are two questions currently being asked: When will recycling stay in Clinton County and when will this program become weekly? First question, the City of Clinton belongs to the Clinton County Area Solid Waste Agency. CCASWA is working on transforming their recycling center into a single-stream recycling transfer facility. Once they are ready, we will transport our recycling to them.

The second question, when can

we do this weekly? First, there are some operational changes that will be needed. We must justify that change and cost. Second, our staff are keeping track on the numbers who is recycling on which week and how changes for the future could be affected. Stay tuned as we continue working on our solid waste and recycling programs.

Finally, thank you to each of you for taking recycling seriously and making a lasting impact on our environment. We always welcome your comments and would like to continue to improve our service.

Thank you from the Solid Waste Department and the City of Clinton.

CALENDAR PARKING

Calendar parking shall be activated with the occurrence of a Snow Event, which is defined as the accumulation of one inch (1") or more of snow upon the public right-of-way.

1. During the period from November 15th through March 15th, when a Snow Event has occurred, parking is restricted in the public right-of-way to alternate sides of the roadway in the following manner:

a. On odd-numbered days, vehicles shall only be parked, stopped or left standing on that side of the roadway having odd-numbered addresses.

b. On even-numbered days, vehicles shall only be parked, stopped or left standing on that side of the roadway having even-numbered addresses.

2. A Snow Event will remain in effect for 24 hours after the snow has stopped.

3. The hours for calendar parking will be from 9 A.M. to 6 A.M. Vehicles will have three (3) hours to be moved to the correct side of the roadway to avoid risk of civil citation.

4. The date at 6 A.M. shall determine if the day is odd or even.

5. During a Snow Emergency, Calendar Parking shall be in effect – except on designated snow routes where no parking will be permitted until the Snow Emergency has been cancelled.

6. This ordinance shall not apply to commercial districts where parking is designated on both sides of the street.

Don't Forget to Register Your Pets for 2019!

The City's fee for pet registrations has not changed. It is still \$10 per animal and is good for the calendar year running January 2019 – December 2019. The license form can be found on the City's website at www.cityofclintoniowa.us under the Finance Department > Forms.

5 Reasons to Get Your Animal Licensed

Being a pet owner requires all sorts of responsibility. One that is often overlooked is registering your pet with your city government and getting your dog or cat licensed. The American Humane Association indicates that 62% of U.S. households own a pet. Another national average indicates that only 16% of pets are estimated to be licensed in the United States. Failing to license your pet can hinder your chances of getting him back if picked up by the pound, and can get you in trouble with the law.

If the above isn't reason enough for you to properly register your pets, here are a few more reasons why you should:

1. It is the law. In most states, it's mandatory that pet owners have their

animals licensed. If you get caught without a license, which can and does happen, you will be hit with a hefty fine.

2. If your pet goes missing, having him licensed drastically improves your chances of getting him back. A license tag helps animal control and shelters quickly identify your pet and get him back to you safely. If your pet is found wandering the streets, a rescue organization can easily look up your pet via its license identifying number. Animals that are licensed tend to be kept at the shelter longer than unlicensed animals.

3. The cost of the license is far less than the penalty for being caught without one. If a city official finds your pet without a license, you could be cited with a municipal infraction or civil penalty, and subject to a fine of up to \$500.

4. Licensing lets people know that your pet is up to date on its rabies vaccinations. An animal cannot be licensed unless it is properly vaccinated. Animal control or a Good Samaritan will be much more likely to want to handle and care for your missing pup if they know that it is

healthy and sans rabies.

5. License fees support the efforts of many local animal shelters. If you purchase your pet license at the Humane Society, half of the annual fee that you pay to license your pet goes to the shelter to help keep the shelter running.

Where to get your pet licensed

You may visit City Hall; you may purchase at the Humane Society; you may purchase from Midwest Pets for Life at their portable spay/neuter clinics; or you may apply for a license by mail. www.cityofclintoniowa.us

What is required to get a license?

All dogs, cats and ferrets over four months and older must be licensed.

In order to apply for a pet license, you must provide a certificate showing that your pet is up to date with its rabies vaccinations.

If you license your pet in one city and then move to another, you may need to apply for a new license. Check with your city for more information.

Street Sweeping

As Autumn commences and the leaves begin to change color and fall, the Street Department will start the street sweeping process at the south end of town and work their way to the north end of Clinton. Please be advised, the entire process may take up to 4 weeks to complete. PLEASE do not rake any leaves into the street, as the debris clogs the catch basins and storm sewers, which can lead to backups.

Daylight Savings Time Ends

Don't forget to turn your clocks back on Sunday, Nov. 4th and change the batteries in your smoke alarms! If you do not have a smoke alarm, please contact the Clinton Fire Department at: 563-242-0125 to schedule an alarm installation.

Burn Rules

From October 1 - November 15th, the City of Clinton will allow open burning for those with lots one acre or larger on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturdays between the hours of: 10 am – 5 pm, weather and wind permitting. Fires must be no closer than 25 feet to a structure or other combustible material. Open burning is limited to: piles of clean, dry, untreated wood and lumber and landscape waste. The piles should not be burned larger than 3 feet in diameter and 2 feet high. All fires must be attended by an adult with an extinguishing agent readily available.

Animal Protection

All animal complaints should go to the Police Department Animal Protection Officer at 243-1458. If there is a situation that requires assistance, another department may be asked to assist.

Snow Emergencies

When predictions indicate the need for a snow emergency, or a snowfall of 4 inches or more occurs, the City Administrator or authorized representative shall declare a snow emergency and shall notify the news media to publicize the proclamation and the parking rules thereunder.

Reminders: Large Item Collection & Used Sharps


The City of Clinton no longer provides Large Item Collection – for persons needing to dispose of large items, they may be taken directly to the Clinton County Area Solid Waste Agency.

Following Clinton County Area Solid Waste Agency requirements, the City of Clinton does not collect and/or dispose of used sharps, as they pose a potential threat

to the Sanitation workers. However, residents may transport and dispose of sharps collected in an empty laundry soap container, labeled and dropped off free of charge at the Clinton County Area Solid Waste Agency.

AXON CITIZEN

Thanks to smartphones, evidence is everywhere. In a recent survey, 21% of responders said they had video or photo evidence that could help an officer's investigation. Yet, nearly 40% did nothing with it.

Collecting and managing digital evidence has become a top concern for police agencies especially during high-profile cases or major crises. Unfortunately, time constraints, in-person witness corroboration, and evidence sorting pitfalls hinder efforts. As a result, crimes can go unsolved. Axon Citizen can help.

Axon Citizen is a public safety portal provided by Axon, the same company that provides body camera services to Clinton PD. When an officer or detective learns that a citizen has captured media relevant to an ongoing investigation, CPD will be able to invite the citizen to upload the media to a website — Evidence.com — managed by the department.

Axon Citizen simplifies the evidence-collection process by providing officers and the community quick and secure tools for submitting and verifying media. The key features of Axon Citizen, including:

- The one-on-one community evidence submission portal
- A community-wide, broadcast tool that allows CPD to request evidence from the public
- The triage tool which sorts and identifies the most relevant evidence that's submitted during a crisis

The Clinton Police Department will begin using this new software to allow citizens to upload video footage of police interactions for ongoing investigations.

The system will be useful in supplementing body camera footage. Citizen footage will give CPD a more complete picture of an incident, especially when citizens film an incident before officers arrived on the scene.

In addition to collecting footage, Axon Citizen tracks, organizes and tags the media in a way that makes it easier for CPD to use for ongoing investigations.

The new program is more efficient than having citizens turn in their devices to download the footage. Instead of taking that device, downloading the information off of that device, putting that information on a file or disk and then inventorying it, we don't need to take the device.

To access Evidence.com, citizens must receive an email or text invitation from the department.

Finding evidence is easy. Collecting, vetting, and securing it is another story. Axon Citizen accelerates the review of video evidence so officers can spend more time solving the crime and less time processing mass amounts of data.



CLINTON ANIMAL PROTECTION OFFICER

The Clinton Police Department is proud to announce the hiring of Jaci Mulholland as the Clinton Police Department's Animal Protection Officer (APO). APO Mulholland started September 25, 2018 and is currently in training. The APO is a new position in the department and will have a greater range of authority than the past Animal Control Officer position. Once the APO position is up and running, APO Mulholland may be required to attend the Iowa law Enforcement Academy and become a sworn Police Officer. Successful graduation as a Police Officer will also strengthen the authority of the APO position.

The Animal Protection Officer will be responsible for impound, confiscate or quarantine stray, injured or aggressive domestic or wild animals capable of spreading disease or posing a threat to public health or safety, and investigate

citizen complaints pertaining to animal related calls such as barking, running at large, cruelty, mistreatment / neglect and prohibited animals. APO Mulholland will issue citations in violation of Clinton City ordinance with regard to the health, safety, welfare, control and licensing of animals. She will also conduct follow up investigation from other Officer initiated animal related incidents.

Officer Mulholland is a true animal lover and will promote responsible pet ownership and education of the Clinton animal ordinance via presentations in classrooms, social clubs, safety events and neighborhood meetings.

We are happy to have APO Mulholland and believe she is a perfect fit for the position. Please continue to report your animal concerns to the Clinton Police Department at 563-243-1458.

CHECK YOUR CHECKS

Where's your checkbook at - right now? Is it in your purse, do you leave it in your car, or in a kitchen drawer at home? How about your extra boxes of blank checks. Where are they? Do you keep them in your night stand, a desk drawer, or a shoe box in the closet? Do you believe they are safe there?

We've written about crimes of opportunity in earlier Lighthouse articles. In those articles we encouraged you to keep your car locked and take your keys with you, to keep personal property such as lawn mowers and bicycles put away in a locked garage, and generally take away the opportunity for a passerby with ill intentions to make you a victim.

In this issue, let's focus on another crime of opportunity that you may not think about until it happens to you. That is, personal check security. In today's age of debit and credit cards, check writing may seem old fashioned. In a way, it is because carrying around a check book is inconvenient. Writing the check at the checkout counter is inconvenient, and if I'm the person behind you in line, it's inconvenient! Checks are easily lost, stolen, or forgotten about. However, checks still serve a valid purpose. Checks are useful in making payments for rent or other higher dollar amount purchases or bills.

Clinton Police Department investigates several cases involving checks that were lost, stolen, or the amount and payee was changed. Also, criminals find old checks from closed accounts that were found in basements, drawers, or the trash. The criminals fill out these old checks and pass them at a local business. The check is returned to the business unpaid and the account holder is held responsible.

To protect yourself, try to implement some of these tactics to help you avoid being defrauded:

- Limit your check writing as much as possible. Pay credit card and utility bills online. Sign up for online auto-pay so that the money is directly withdrawn from your checking account each month.
- Always complete a check using a pen with ink that cannot be erased or chemically washed off of the check.
- When mailing a check, don't use your mailbox. This is an opportunity for criminals to steal your check and alter it for their benefit. Take your check to the post office or a US Post Office mailbox.
- Don't leave check books in your car. At home, keep your check book and extra pads of checks in a secure lockbox.
- Shred or otherwise destroy all obsolete checks from closed or old accounts that aren't used any longer.
- Reconcile your monthly bank statement promptly.

Any time you write a check, you are essentially handing out your bank's name, routing number and account information, along with your name, address and other identifiers about yourself. These are the keys to your financial kingdom.

We hear every day from people who thought they would never be a victim of crime. Take the steps necessary today to protect yourself from this crime of opportunity.

IOWA'S "MOVE OVER" LAW EXPANDS

Effective July 1, 2018, Iowa's "Move Over" law had changes that motorists need to know about. To give you a brief history, Iowa first put the law (Iowa Code 321.323) in effect in 2002. In 2002, only certain emergency and maintenance vehicles were included in the law. In 2017, it included utility vehicles and others working along the roadway. The 2018 version of the law now includes any/all vehicles displaying flashing or hazard lights, including private vehicles who may be stopped due to emergencies or vehicle trouble.

If you have to pull over in an emergency situation, turn on your flashers. This allows motorists to see you better. If you are driving and see a vehicle

(any vehicle) on the side of the road with its hazard lights on, you need to move into a lane not adjacent to the stationary motor vehicle if possible. If a lane change is impossible, prohibited by law, or unsafe, then a driver must reduce the speed of the motor vehicle to a reasonable and proper speed for the existing road and traffic conditions, which speed shall be less than the posted speed limit, and be prepared to stop. This is for the safety of everyone.

The penalty for violating the Move Over law is \$100 plus surcharge and court costs. If this involves an accident, the driver may also lose their license.

CLINTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

"WHAT WE DO"

The Clinton Fire Department was established in 1890 as a full-time career organization, and today is an ISO 2 rated department, providing Fire, Rescue, and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) to the City of Clinton, Iowa, population 26,872. Our primary response district encompasses 36 square miles, in a mixed use of urban, residential, industrial, and rural settings. Through legal agreements, we also provide our services on an automatic and mutual aid basis to our surrounding neighbors in Clinton County, Iowa and Whiteside County, Illinois.

CFD operates out of three fire stations, including:

- Central Fire Station (Station 1) 344 3rd Ave. S. – Built 1937
- Chancy Fire Station (Station 2) 2303 S. 14th St. – Built 1957, addition 2011
- Lyons Fire Station (Station 3) 2311 Roosevelt – Built 1914

Staffing

CFD operates with 45 full time employees. Administration is overseen by the Fire Chief, and the Building Department, which operates as a branch of CFD, is supervised by Battalion Chief Jeff Chapman. One additional staff position, which oversees training and EMS, is Battalion Chief Greg Forari. We operate three separate duty shifts, with each shift being staffed by a Battalion Chief, three Lieutenants, five Engineers (Drivers), and five Firefighters. Shifts work 24 hour days, starting at 7:00 a.m., utilizing a "California Swing" schedule of 1 day on, 1 day off, 1 day on, 1 day off, 1 day on, 4 days off.

Minimum Staffing

Clinton Fire Department follows a minimum staffing rule of 11 firefighters on any given shift. This means that if a shift falls below 11 person staffing, due to vacations, sick leave, etc., extra staffing will be called in at overtime pay. By proactively monitoring the schedule, CFD management reduces this overtime possibility by shifting firefighters per the union contract.

National Fire Protection Administration (NFPA) recommendations for safe fire ground operations indicate that 11 person staffing does not meet the threshold of safety. We overcome this with the use of Automatic Aid, whereby we depend on an additional fire company from another department to be dispatched to the scene of a structure fire call.

Services Provided by CFD

Fire/Rescue – Includes fire suppression for industrial, commercial, and residential, as well as our agricultural residents. Haz - Mat response at the Operations level, high angle and rope rescue, confined space entry, water and ice rescue, vehicle extrication, and ground search and rescue.

All of our firefighters are trained at the Firefighter II level at minimum, and all of our officers are at least Fire Officer I designation. These are nationally certified credentials. Many have advanced training in the disciplines listed above.

A stat worthy of mention from 2014 is that the total valuation of structures responded to for fire calls was \$11,087,900 and the reported property loss collectively for those structures was \$1,122,616. This equates to \$9,965,284 in value of property saved for the year, which can be attributed to adequate response numbers (thanks in part to auto-aid agreements), highly trained and strategically deployed firefighting crews, and proper and well maintained equipment.

Emergency Medical Services (EMS)

All of our firefighters are all trained to respond at the Paramedic Specialist level, which is also a nationally certified credential. Our fire based EMS model and the geographic deployment of our resources allows for quick patient response times, allowing a better chance for positive patient outcomes.

EMS Response – Our EMS crews in 2014 had an initial unit response time to 78.92% of all calls in under 5 minutes of less, with a full response time of all units called less than 9 minutes for 98.11% of calls. The 5 minute mark falls short of the National Standard of 90%, while the 9 minute mark exceeds.

One of the most impressive stats for 2014 is in the case of CPR calls. CFD responded to 42 full "codes", where a patient was absent a palpable pulse and breathing. Of the 42 patients, 16 were delivered to the hospital with a pulse, and at least 8 left the ER alive. This far exceeds the American Heart Association percentage of 10.4 percent, and can be directly attributed to fast response times and the high level training and experience of our EMS responders. (CY 2016 stats available soon)

Fire Prevention/Public Education/ Fire Investigation

Using on-duty staff, CFD takes an aggressive approach towards delivering our fire prevention message to the community. We try to encompass all age groups, but focus primarily on school aged children and our seniors. Utilizing our fire prevention trailer, and a robotic helper named "Freddie", we take our message to the streets any chance we get.

Also, per Iowa law, we actively investigate all fires for cause. Utilizing again our trained staff, we work very hard to determine what causes a fire, and then hopefully use that data to drive our fire prevention message. When fires fall into the "arson" category, CFD staff, in conjunction with CPD investigators and the State Fire Marshal's Office, work hand in hand to collect evidence, interview those involved, and prosecute the guilty.

Building and Neighborhood Services (BNS)

2014 was our first full year providing operational leadership to the Building and Neighborhood Services division. Under the direction of Battalion Chief Jeff Chapman, the operation there has been reorganized, with an emphasis on consistent and fair enforcement of the codes, and customer friendly service to those who use the departments and its services.

Some of the highlights since CFD has assumed oversight at BNS were credentialing of inspectors, and the adoption of a current family of codes. We now have certified inspectors in commercial and residential building codes, commercial and residential electrical codes, plan review, and soon commercial and residential plumbing. As of January 1, 2015, the 2012 family of ICC Codes are in effect.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

2018 was another busy year for road construction. Once again we were able to repair nearly as many streets as possible in one construction season, with some still not on target for completion until next spring.

Here is a quick overview of some of our construction projects for the year:

General Asphalt Resurfacing Projects

Early this spring and summer many of our construction efforts were focused on the area west of 5th Street, between Main Avenue and 22nd Avenue North. All of North 6th Street, 7th Street, 8th Street, and 9th Street was essentially reconstructed between the curbs in this neighborhood. The newly provided surface is a 4" thick section of asphalt on a stabilized stone base. These roads were built for a 40 year lifetime, with the first resurfacing necessary in approximately 20 years. It had been 50 years since anything had been done on these streets, so they were in dire need of help. The project wasn't without problems, as many of these streets required substantial excavation and subgrade stabilization, in order to guarantee a good asphalt product on top. Many of the other streets in this subdivision received either a fog seal (Buell Avenue, 23rd Avenue North, 10th Street) or a chip seal (23rd Avenue North), as we must maintain a focus on pavement preservation in order to get more life out of our streets.

Around mid-summer, these same asphalt crews made their way over to a similar project in the Orchard Heights subdivision, where many of these long forgotten roadways were resurfaced. In this neighborhood, we found a couple roads that had to be fully reconstructed, but for the most part the project consisted of a simple resurfacing of the asphalt roads within the subdivision. Another component of this project was ADA compliance, as all of the accessible curb ramps were reconstructed in accordance with federal code. The streets resurfaced as part of this project

were South 15th Street, South 17th Street, 6th Avenue South, 7th Avenue South, Orchard Lane, Orchard Court, and Surrey Court. All of these streets were also designed for a similar life cycle, which will include pavement preservation tactics over the first 20 years, with a first resurfacing in about 2038.

One important project this summer was the resurfacing of North 3rd Street between Main Avenue and 37th Avenue North. The most stressful part of this project was worker safety and traffic control during construction. Due to obvious reasons, this road had to be left open during construction, which meant the workers had to be extra careful. Luckily nobody was injured during construction and for the most part the project went well from start to finish. This project was designed as an asphalt overlay of an existing concrete pavement. Before the asphalt was paved, about 25% of the underlying concrete had to be repaired, which was by far the most time consuming part of the project. We fixed every faulted or failed concrete joint in order to provide a stable base for the new asphalt. Though all of the concrete joints will reflect through to the surface, this asphalt will still provide a good wearing course for at least the next 15 years. With the integrity of the concrete restored below, 3rd Street should withstand at least 4 resurfacing cycles until the road will need to be reconstructed. In order for this to work, it will be crucial to preserve the pavement. For this reason, you will see crack sealing throughout the lifetime of this asphalt street. Other components to this project were storm sewer intake repair and ADA compliance throughout the corridor. There were 48 ADA curb ramps constructed on this project, which essentially connects the Discovery Trail at the north end with downtown Lyons.

One of our most successful projects this year was the reconstruction of South 21st Street, between Manufacturing Drive and Harrison Drive. This

road sees heavy truck traffic, so a simple resurfacing would not have been a sustainable project. Thus, we collaborated with a local contractor to come up with a design that would be both sustainable and cost effective. The design chosen for this project was Full Depth Reclamation. This is a process by which the existing asphalt section (in this case 10" thick) was rejuvenated and used as the base for the new paving.

Full Depth Reclamation included milling the existing pavement and leaving it on-grade, where a reclamation machine is then able to follow up the milling with a process that adds an asphalt oil product to the old road particles. The mixture is then compacted with vibratory rollers and a new pavement base is created. Once this product cured, we then overlaid the reclaimed surface with three layers of new hot mix asphalt. The final product is a smooth and durable street which will hold up to the pounding of the heavy trucks. Depending on the condition of the roadway, we will add a 2" surface in 5-10 years, which will give us a full 8" section of roadway. The roadway was designed for a life cycle of 30-40 years, depending on truck traffic volumes over that time period.

Other streets that were resurfaced this year as part of our program included Garfield Street (2200 block), Melrose Court (5th to 8th Ave S), 8th Avenue North (11th Street to east), 6th Avenue South (4th to 7th Street), and Woodlawn Court. Most of these projects included a simple resurfacing of the street with 3-4 inches of asphalt, intended to last for up to 20 years with proper maintenance.

The final act of 2018 resurfacing will be the 13th Avenue North project, between Mill Creek Parkway and the western city limit line. This is a joint project with Clinton County, as the project extends all the way to the town of Elvira. Earlier this year, we added guardrails and shoulder wedges to the bridge over Mill Creek, and patched the remainder of the failed concrete

road. Over the past 5 years, almost 35% of the concrete has been patched in anticipation of this overlay project. The current project consisted of a small widening on each side of the shoulder, and a 4" thick asphalt overlay on the existing concrete.

We plan to add another 2" of asphalt over the next 5-7 years, in order to provide more structure for the beating this road takes by garbage trucks. Similar to North 3rd Street, this road will need to be preserved properly in order to keep the water out of the pavement. Crack sealing will be prevalent on this street in order to preserve what we have.

General Concrete Reconstruction Projects

Concrete rehabilitation and reconstruction got a late start this year. Many of our concrete projects included underground work and subgrade stabilization, which are time consuming. The following streets were reconstructed with full depth concrete in 2018:

- 11th Avenue North between Sweetbriar Road and North 13th Street
- North 13th Street from 11th Avenue North to 500' to the south
- Cleveland Street from 27th Avenue North to 28th Avenue North
- 27th Avenue North from Pershing Blvd to Cleveland Street

The following roadways will be reconstructed later this fall, if weather allows, with 6" of concrete on a full depth rock base.

- South 8th Street, from 7th Avenue South to 8th Avenue South
- 10th Avenue North, from North 13th Street to North 12th Street
- 28th Avenue North, from North 3rd Street to Pershing Blvd
- 29th Avenue North, from North 3rd Street to Pershing Blvd

Next year, we will reconstruct and patch most of the Cragmor

and Lakewood Terrace Subdivision. This will be the first project of 2019.

The Future

We still plan to allocate \$3.3 million per year in 2019 and 2020 for street rehabilitation of our worst streets. According to research by the Center for Transportation Research (CTRE) at Iowa State University, this

will bring the overall pavement condition index to around 65 out of 100, which is better than the average city in the State of Iowa. For reference, Clinton's Pavement Condition index was around 40/100 in 2008.

Below is a tentative schedule of street paving on tap for the next two years, which is all subject to change or approval by the City Council.

REGIONAL WATER RECLAMATION FACILITY

WHAT IS F.O.G.?

The type of F.O.G., that the Regional Water Recovery Facility (RWRF) is talking about is not the fog you see in the air. We are talking about the fats, oils, and grease (F.O.G.) that can go down the drain and cause major problems. When we say major, we are talking drain and pipe clogging, backups and so much more! No one will enjoy the mess that can occur from poor management of F.O.G.

The City of Clinton has a program to assist restaurants and other food establishments with a rebate of up to \$1,500.00 for installation of a grease interceptor. This will help with controlling the amount of grease, fats and oils leaving your facility into the sewer system. This is a requirement for all restaurants by the Code 52.038 (A)(1) by June 30, 2020, will be subject to a penalty of \$50.00 per day of non-compliance.

After July 31, 2020, daily fines assessed under this subsection shall cease and any person or entity not in compliance shall be subject to termination of service pursuant to Code

52.041. They are also subject to any other penalties provided for in this Chapter, the Iowa Code, or any other federal laws or regulations.

How can a restaurant be in compliance and receive the rebate? Visit cityofclintoniowa.us and go to Regional Water Recovery Center. Click on F.O.G and find the application. This is an online form and will allow for the RWRF and Building and Neighborhood Services (BNS) to be notified that your business wants to start the application process. BNS will handle the plumbing permit portion of the program and RWRF will work on the permitting for the F.O.G. program.

Once both departments have reviewed the information, inspected the facility and the equipment, the business is eligible for the rebate. All F.O.G participants are inspected early for their program. Any questions regarding F.O.G. can be directed to RWRF at 563.243.4064.

Code 52.038 (A)(1) is part of the EPA Code for water reclamation facilities and F.O.G. Programs.

WHAT CAN RESIDENTS DO FOR F.O.G.?

Residents are just as responsible for fats, oils, and grease as restaurants are. Here are few tips for preventing clogged pipes, sewer backups, and other issues associated with F.O.G. at home.

- Do not dump free flowing oils down the drain.
- Wipe off dishes that have oil residue before washing.
- Keep drains clean of food debris
- Clean out the strainer in your dish washer

Deep Frying A Turkey for the Holidays?

What you can do with the oil afterwards?

- Do not dispose of it down the drain!
- Wait until the oil cools and put it into a container that will hold it with a lid. (Use the container the oil came in)
- Take the cooking oil to the Clinton County Area Solid Waste Agency, 4292 220th St., Clinton, IA for proper disposal. This is part of the Regional Collection Center Program and there is no charge for this service.



DO:

- Place cart in the appropriate location on collection day with arrow pointing in the proper direction
- Carts need to be out by **7 AM** on collection day
- Place all trash bags in the proper grey cart
- Place all yard waste (grass, leaves) in the proper green cart
- All recycling in the proper blue cart
- Make sure the lid is closed properly at time of collection
- Place cart away from garages, homes, recycling buckets, parked cars, etc. on collection day
- Return the cart to your house/garage when empty

Please put items in the correct containers:

- Only recycling belongs in the blue cart.
- Only waste belongs in the grey cart.
- Only yard waste belongs in the green cart
- **The city will not collect the waste unless it is in the proper container**

DO NOT:

- Put hazardous waste, paint cans, oil or electronic waste in the cart
- Put construction debris in the cart
- Put hot ashes in the cart
- Overfill the cart or pack trash too tightly
- Do not park any vehicles near the carts on collection day
- Paint or write on the cart except in space provided on the cart lid or remove the cart from your residence

REMINDER: Yard waste collection ends on November 30th OR, the first snowfall - whichever comes first.

Why Does Yard Waste Collection End for Winter?

Winter months slow down the need for yard waste collection. We also know that yard waste can freeze in yard waste carts, which causes issues for dumping of materials and can damage carts.

We also use our staff between collections and streets, which we need to be ready for winter weather. As you may notice, we push collection days back if we have a large snowfall.


