CLINTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

Clinton Fire Department recommends checking your Carbon Monoxide Alarms

Often called the invisible killer, carbon monoxide (CO) is an odorless gas created when fuels burn incompletely. "In the home, malfunctioning fuel-burning appliances such as furnaces, ranges, water heaters and room heaters can be sources of CO", says Jeff Chapman, Assistant Chief/Fire Marshal of the Clinton Fire Department. Vehicles running in an attached garage or generators, or any other equipment that has an engine, running inside a home or in an attached garage, or outside

a home near open doors, windows or air intake vents can also produce dangerous levels of CO.

Proper installation, operation, and maintenance of fuel-burning appliances in the home is the most important factor in reducing the risk of CO poisoning. Make sure appliances are installed and operated according to the manufacturer's instructions and local building codes. Consumers should have their heating system inspected by a qualified professional and serviced

every year to make sure the system is working properly. Inspections should also include checking the exhaust ventilation through checking chimneys, vents and flues.

Portable generators must be operated outside only. Never operate one inside a home, garage, basement, crawlspace, shed, or in semi-enclosed areas because doing so can also generate lethal carbon monoxide levels. Keep generators at least 20 feet away from the house. Never burn

charcoal in fireplaces or barbecue grills inside homes or in semi-enclosed areas.

The only way to detect CO is with a working CO alarm. "People need to be well-educated on the importance of having these alarms, their proper placement, and their maintenance as well as understanding the signs and symptoms of CO poisoning," says Assistant Chief Chapman. STREETS & SOLID WASTE DEPARTMENT


The City of Clinton Street Department has several responsibilities within the city's rights-of-way. Some of these responsibilities include: pothole repairs; putting up and replacing street signage; street sweeping; snow & ice removal on city streets; alley grading; right-of-way mowing and weed spraying; and removing fallen trees, branches, and debris within the roadway. The City

of Clinton Solid Waste Department is responsible for the collection of the city-owned garbage, yard waste and recycling carts.

On August 10, 2020 the Derecho storm hit the city which caused significant damage. Debris cleanup lasted for 8 weeks with approximately 20,000,000 pounds of debris being removed from the city rights-of-way. This work consisted of approximately

8,700 work hours. The crews removing the debris involved all Public Works employees (streets, sewer maintenance, solid waste and facilities and grounds), DOT, City of Dubuque parks division and local contractors. Thank you to everyone who helped!

The Street and Solid Waste Department strive to maintain the safety and health of our community in all our endeavors.

A Message From...

The City Of Clinton Mayor And City Administrator

Last fall the focus was on how a City should look and act and how to attract people to live and work here. At the time we used a Mark Twain quote. Mr. Twain was a true believer in the power of the Mississippi and wrote about adventures up and down the river. He is quoted as saying, "We take stock of a city like we take stock of a man. The clothes or appearance are the externals by which we judge."

Clinton has over 22 parks and 500 acres, containing multi-use trails, playgrounds, pickleball, sand volleyball, basketball, multi-use fields, and facilities.

Eagle Point Park consists of over 150 acres and a fantastic view of the Mississippi River. From this vantage point visitors can see wildlife, eagles, boating, fishing and commerce that are part of Clinton's daily fabric. Numerous significant improvements have been completed and more are on the horizon for Eagle Point Park.

Riverview Park consists of 65 acres and hosts public art, memorials, festivals and concerts free of charge throughout the year. It is also free to access the pickleball and sand volleyball courts as well as the newly installed National Fitness Campaign area. There is plenty of free renovated parking areas at the Nelson Corp Baseball Field (LumberKings) and at the swimming pool.

The City of Clinton (on the heels of being revaluated as an Iowa Great Place) obtained a \$248,000 grant that continues our efforts on improving the riverfront. One aspect of the project is updating current bump-outs with new stamped-concrete ones. The bump-outs will provide a variety of fun, attractive, and practical seating areas with

some of the best views in all of eastern Iowa. We will soon be adding a variety of unique seating options such as swings, picnic tables and benches, along with trees and trash cans.

Another aspect of the project is stamped concrete at the Showboat Theater entrance (including ADA access off the street), around the iconic Lubbers Fountain, and the creation of the nesting area for the Clinton County Freedom Rock. All of the stamped concrete will make for attractive gathering spots, better drainage, easier access for all, and the entire area will be visually cohesive.


The project will also include the renovation of the Clinton Discovery multi-modal Trail. Once renovation is complete, the 12-mile trail will be hard-surfaced, fully-functional and safe. People of all abilities will be able to use the trail and access the bump-out seating areas. From the most able-bodied runners and bikers to those in modified bikes, wheelchairs, walkers, joggers, skaters, and strollers - all will truly have access to this free amenity. With added lighting and security cameras placed the length of the trail, visibility and security will be improved for all users. Stamped concrete and rest areas with benches will allow users to access the trail from numerous points along the route and to stop or rest at those points too. If you don't want to travel along the trail, you can simply use the seating areas and engage with the mighty river and all of the activity it provides.

The hard surface and pavers will allow snow, ice and rain to dissipate more quickly and therefore, the trail and other areas will be safe and accessible more days of the year.

Another upgrade along the river-front includes the addition of two ADA compliant RV parking areas at the RV Park.

The Crunelle WWI monument located at the intersection of 5th Avenue South and Veterans Memorial Drive (Riverview Drive) received a complete laser repair of the bronze surface last year which revitalized the monument to its original glory. A Mayoral ribbon cutting/reveal is scheduled for November 11, 2020 (Veterans Day) at 1:30 p.m., with support from the American Legion, AMVETS and VFW.

We know that once the park and trail improvements are complete, it will serve not only our community members, but it will also be used as a retention and recruitment tool for businesses. This will be an exciting asset to feature in our tourism marketing to attract bikers, runners, and walkers to Clinton. The impact of trails on economic and tourist dollars has been well-documented for many decades. For a city the size of Clinton, and one that has experienced population decline in the past decades, amenities such as a multimodal trail have the potential to be a game-changer. Trails can help in retention and recruitment of economic dollars, tourism dollars and the health and well-being of its human capital. When trails are well-maintained and connect to other resources in the city, the benefits multiply many times over. With Clinton's unique placement adjacent to the Mississippi River, and with the numerous amenities often found only in larger cities, elevating Clinton's Riverview Park to top-notch standards will continue to make Clinton an exciting weekend – or lifetime – destination.



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CLINTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

Lexipol

One of the biggest challenges a police department has is keeping up with legislative changes and training mandates, maintaining positive community relations, and ensuring officer and citizen safety. Sometimes this is done with reduced funding and growing threats. In 2019, Chief Gyron recognized outdated and inadequate policies and procedures manuals that didn't reflect current practices within the department. Chief chose Lexipol, a proven police risk management company to provide fully developed state-specific policies researched and written by subject matter experts and vetted by attorneys. The conversion to the new policies started in May 2019.

Even the best policy manual isn't effective if it's not backed by the ongoing training also provided by Lexipol. Lexipol's Daily Training Bulletins provide a system of solid, realistic, ongoing, and verifiable training to help personnel learn to apply the new policies and improve their ability to make well-reasoned decisions. Because Lexipol is constantly

monitoring local and state mandates, they can provide updates and recommend changes in policies quicker and more efficiently. This was evident with Iowa House File 2647 that directed departments in June 2020 to address the Use of Force topics like chokeholds, exhausting all alternatives before applying deadly force, giving warnings before using deadly force and restrictions on shooting at a moving vehicle.

This caused many police departments to struggle to re-write their current policies. This mandate had little effect on the Clinton Police Department's already high standard of policies. The recommended changes by Lexipol were anticipated, it automatically sent the updated policies out to department members. Officers have 24/7 accessibility to the policy manual and topic-specific training through squad car computers or on their smartphones. Lexipol gives department leaders the confidence our officers are following best practice guidelines.

Accident Reporting

So, you have been in an accident. What should you do? What can you expect the Clinton Police Department to do? With the winter driving season fast approaching, we will hear these questions more. This article will answer those questions for you. By following these guidelines, it will hopefully make a dangerous situation a little less stressful.

1. Ensure that you, your passengers, and the person (s) in the other vehicle are all okay. If there are injuries call 911 immediately. Dispatch will have questions for you and get Fire Department and Police officers on their way. Assess your situation. Are you safe where you are at? Is it safe to move injured parties? If you have doubts, then wait for first responders to arrive.

2. How severe are the damages? Is this a minor fender bender where the vehicles are both still drivable and there are no

injuries? If so, move the vehicles out of the roadway and exchange driver's information with the other party. Name, the insurance company, address, etc. The Clinton Police Department will gladly respond to the scene and assist with this.

3. If there is heavy damage to one or both of the vehicles and they cannot be moved, call 911. Remember to remove yourself and/or any passengers from out of harm's way if the accident is in the roadway. Officers will respond and assess the situation. We will call tow trucks to the scene to remove any vehicle that is not drivable. An officer will investigate the incident and complete an accident report.

Once on scene, officers will ask for your drivers' license, vehicle registration, and proof of insurance. Having these items available will help complete the report more efficiently and may even save you a ticket.

A Child is Missing—What should we do?

The Clinton Police Department responds to several calls for service during the year. A missing person or child call is arguably a stressful call not only to the police but to the reporting party or the parents. Fortunately, most missing child cases are resolved within hours. Recent cases have shown we frequently find missing children because of a thorough investigation and a partnership between the community and the police department.

1. Try to stay calm and call law enforcement immediately. When a child goes missing, the Clinton Police Department recommends that you immediately call local law enforcement. Although it will be hard to do, try not to look for the child until you have alerted law enforcement.

2. Provide your child's information. In the initial stressful moments when you can't find your child, it's common to forget the basic information law enforcement and 911 operators are going to request. However, if you can present facts and information in an organized manner, police will move quickly on any leads. Be prepared to provide as much information about your child as you can including:

- Child's full name
- Child's weight, height, age, and date of

birth

- Clothes the child was last seen wearing
- Last known location, or the last place your child was observed.
- Identifying features, glasses, birthmarks, unique hair color, etc.
- Names and contact information of the child's friends, close relatives, or acquaintances
- Frequently visited hangout spots; parks, school functions, favorite convenience stores, etc.
- Health issues the child has
- Any other possibly relevant details about the time or place the child went missing
- Police and other agencies are going to request a picture, too, so try to find several recent photographs that clearly display distinguishing characteristics.

3. Look in your immediate area. Once law enforcement has been notified, begin searching where you last saw your child. Young children are prone to hide somewhere and fall asleep, so look on all beds, under furniture, in piles of laundry, around vehicles, and inside your washer and dryer.

If you're in a store when a child goes missing, notify the store manager immediately. Many stores follow a missing child protocol, where all employees will stop working to look

for the child and monitor the store's entrance to ensure the child does not leave.

In instances where the child is old enough to have a phone or social media account, they may have left some digital clues. Rather than digging through electronic records yourself, ask the police to explore messaging histories and social sites.

Older children also tend to have run to friends' houses, so call around to friends, family, or neighbors close to your child.

4. Make yourself available. The first 48 hours after a child goes missing are critical. As a parent, you are going to want to help with the physical search, but we recommend parents instead focus energy on gathering and providing information to investigators. Especially as law enforcement may want to check your home and your child's room for evidence - it's common for authorities to take clothing, sheets, computers, and even trash as evidence—you'll want to make sure you're available to give investigators access to anything they need.

Keep your phone line open and put the name and number of the investigator assigned to your case in an easily accessible location. It's also a good idea to write names, numbers, and other information relating to the case in

a designated notebook.

5. Amber Alert. Depending on the circumstances surrounding the disappearance—if officers suspect abduction or feel the child could be in imminent danger—authorities may issue an AMBER Alert to spread the word throughout the community. We utilize the following criteria to determine if we should issue an AMBER Alert in the state of Iowa:

- Law enforcement confirms a child has been abducted and entry made into the IOWA/NCIC systems identifying the child is missing.
- The child is under the age of 18.
- Law enforcement believes the circumstances of the abduction showed that the child is in danger of serious bodily harm or death.
- There is enough descriptive information about the child, abductor, and/or the suspect's vehicle to believe an immediate broadcast alert will help.

Keep in mind that police will only put out an AMBER Alert if they believe a child has been abducted and are in danger of serious bodily harm or death. They strictly adhere to the criteria to discourage overuse of the program that would make it less effective.

Incident Reporting

Historically, when Clinton residents or visitors found themselves a victim of a minor criminal incident, the only options were to call the police and wait for a Police Officer to take a report or go to the Clinton Police Department lobby and report it to a Police Officer in-person. Police Officers used to complete incident reports on paper. However, since 2017 Clinton Police complete all reports electronically.

The Clinton Police Department has and continues to strive to provide the most efficient and effective police service possible to the residents of Clinton. To do this, we have added online Incident Reporting to the Clinton Police Department website <https://clintonpdia.policetocitizen.com/Home>.

Some criteria must be met before a victim can choose online incident reporting. They are as follows:

1. This is not an emergency.
2. The crime is not in progress.
3. The incident has not already been reported by phone or in-person to the police.
4. The incident occurred more than 30 minutes ago.
5. The incident occurred in Clinton, Iowa.
6. There is no evidence or fingerprints for the police to collect.
7. The incident is not a hate or bias crime.

In addition to online reporting, the Clinton Police Department also offers in-person self-reporting incident reports. Victims of less serious crimes can come to

the Clinton Police Department between 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. on weekdays, excluding holidays, and complete an incident report in-person. This is a great service for victims without internet access.

It is important to note that all cases reported online or in-person will be reviewed by the Clinton Police Department. Upon review, if further investigation of a case is needed, you may be contacted. Also, if a case has leads it will be investigated by a Clinton Police Officer. The goal of online and in-person incident reporting is to keep Police Officers in service for in-progress calls for service and pro-active policing. Online and in-person reporting has increased Clinton Police Department efficiency and can be even more effective with the cooperation of the community.

Police Officers handle a variety of calls during a shift. One of the most prevalent calls in the last few months has been persons having a mental crisis. In most cases, we have officers that are specially trained in mental health who respond to these calls. We train these officers to recognize the signs and symptoms and how to de-escalate and build rapport with persons in a mental crisis.

This training has proven to be effective in many situations. We also have partnered with Eastern Iowa Mental Health, who responds with a Mobile Crisis Response Team to continue the de-escalation and get the help the person needs. This is a 24-hour service with reasonable response time.

In August 2020, Mobile Crisis Response responded to 13 calls in Clinton County with 85% of the crisis resolved.

The Clinton Police Department in coordination with Eastern Iowa Mental Health is working towards having a mental health professional ride with our officers to bring services quicker to those in need. This service would be new to Clinton and is considered to be very proactive. If officers were dispatched to a person in crisis, the car with the CIT officer and Mental Health profes-

sional would respond. This concept would immediately provide police service with the ability to conduct a mental health evaluation. With this immediate evaluation, the health professional could guide the person in crisis to the correct service. Those services may include hospitalization, Crisis Stabilization Residence, or outpatient services.

This response by the Police Department and Eastern Iowa Mental Health would provide a non-threatening contact and provide an immediate advocate to the person suffering from a mental health crisis.

The Clinton Fire Department teamed up with the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®) — the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years — to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!" The campaign works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe.

According to NFPA, cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the United States. Almost half (44%) of reported home fires started in the kitchen. Two-thirds (66%) of home cooking fires start with the ignition of food or other cooking materials.

"We know cooking fires can be prevented," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice-president of outreach and advocacy. "Staying in the kitchen, using a timer, and avoiding distractions such as electronics or TV are steps everyone can take to keep families safe in their homes."

The Clinton Fire Department encourages all residents to embrace the 2020 Fire Prevention Week theme.

"The most important step you should take before making a meal is to "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!" said Jeff Chapman, Fire Marshal. "A cooking fire can grow quickly. I have seen many homes damaged and people injured by fires that could easily have been prevented."

The Clinton Fire Department wants to share safety tips to keep you from having a cooking fire. Never leave cooking food unattended. Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling or broiling. If you have to leave, even for a short time, turn off the stove. If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you're cooking. You have to be alert when cooking. You won't be alert if you are sleepy, have taken medicine or drugs, or consumed alcohol that makes you drowsy.

Always keep an oven mitt and pan lid nearby when you're cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan to smother the flame. Turn off the burner, and leave the pan covered until it is completely cool.

Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

What Happens If The Levee Fails?

Thanks to our amazing levee system, few people in Clinton realize the potential for a catastrophic flood is real throughout many areas of town. There is a vast area of Clinton that would be prone to yearly flooding were it not for the magnificent levee system constructed by our forefathers after the persistent flooding incurred in the 1960's and 1970's.

Our levee is an urban flood protection project which was authorized by the United States government in 1962. The levee was completed between 1979 and 1983 in various stages along the right descending bank of the Mississippi River approximately between River Miles 514 and 521.4, or between Mill Creek at the south end and Turtle Creek at the north end. We are responsible for operating and maintaining the levee and the local flood protection system. This means regularly inspecting its integrity, patrolling the length of it to ensure no weak spots present themselves and closing the flood gates as river levels and the Army Corp dictate.

The Clinton levee was designed by the US Army Corps of Engineers to protect the city of Clinton from the 200-year frequency flood of the Mississippi River, which corresponds to a probability of exceedance of 0.5% in any given year (similarly a 100 year flood has a 1% chance of occurring each year, and a 50-year flood has a 2% chance of occurring each year). The entire levee was designed with 3-4 feet of freeboard, with the purpose of safe guarding against levee breach/break scenarios or other unforeseen circumstances.

RIVER STAGES

The local river stage used in the City of Clinton comes from the USGS river gauge which is located in the Mississippi River near Camanche, and real time river stage levels are found on the National Weather Service website at www.weather.gov

The river stage zero reading for this gauge is

set at 562.68' above mean sea level using the 1929 datum (USCGS 5th General Adjustment). Therefore, for example, when the local river stage is reported to be 17.00 feet, the elevation of the river at Camanche is 579.68' above mean sea level using the 1929 datum. Since the river does have a slope of approximately 6" per mile depending on flows, the actual river elevation in Clinton will vary depending on location.

To put river flooding into perspective in reference to our community, different river stages in Clinton will correspond to various local flood events, as listed below:

- Stage 17.8' – Local Flood Stage is report by National Weather Service, marina flood gates are in
- Stage 19.0' – Flood water begins to affect the Candlelight restaurant and other marina facilities
- Stage 21.0' – Flood water begins to affect properties at 2600 block of Garfield Street
- Stage 23.0' – Flood water begins to affect properties east of Garfield Street and north of 27th Avenue North along the Clinton riverfront
- Stage 24.0' – Flood water begins to affect properties abutting Mill Creek in the commercial district including Kohl's, hotels, and Nestle Purina
- Stage 29.0' – Mississippi River is close to the top of the levee in some locations. At this point, we are worried about levee breach or overtopping at low points in the levee.

Historical Mississippi River crests are as follows:

- (1) 24.65' on 04/28/1965
- (2) 23.62' on 04/24/2001
- (3) 22.98' on 07/08/1993
- (4) 21.93' on 04/21/2011
- (5) 21.90' on 04/8/2019

With the exception of the flood in 1965, these large flood events were mostly contained by

the levee system. After the construction of the levee all of these instances were almost entirely controlled by the levee system resulting in zero lasting damage. However, given a scenario where the levee system wasn't constructed today's reality would look much different. At a river stage of 21.9' as has been the recent crest the river would have left its banks flooding nearly everything east of 2nd Street and south of 7th Ave North. Riverview Park would be off limits, parts of downtown would have to install boat parking and the further south you go the deeper the water would get.

FLOOD INUNDATION MAPS

In order to be prepared for floods, it is imperative that the citizens of our community are informed of possible flood impacts at various river stages. The maps below depict the approximate level of inundation. These maps are derived from topographic info and interpolations of Corps of Engineers river flow data. They are conservative in nature, and should only be used as a guide for planning purposes.



Fall Safety Driving Tips

Fall in Iowa is a beautiful season, but it brings on its own set of driving hazards that can cause damage or injury if you're inattentive when behind the wheel. Here are eight things that require special attention in this season.

1. Kids: Maybe you're used to all the back-to-school traffic already. But stay wary in school zones; not only for kids walking but also for inexperienced drivers in school zones picking up friends or siblings.

2. Darkness: When Daylight Saving Time ends, many people will spend more time driving in the dark. The National Safety Council warns. "Depth perception, color recognition, and

peripheral vision can be compromised in the dark, and the glare of headlights from an oncoming vehicle can temporarily blind a driver." The rolling back of the clocks means more people are out during the first few hours of darkness.

3. Animals: The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety says you're 3.5 times as likely to hit an animal, especially a deer, in November than at any other time of the year. Iowa has one of the highest proportions of collision claims with animals, according to the institute and State Farm Insurance. An adult deer can weigh 300 pounds or more, causing extreme damage if hit at higher speeds.

4. Leaves: Hazardous conditions can occur as the foliage falls and winds blow leaves on the roadways. They can cause motorists to park further from the curb to accommodate piles, create puddles as they block drainage, hide potholes and pavement markings, prompt bicyclists to stray from their designated lanes, and turn into a slick mess when they coat the road during rain.

5. Tires: Fall is a good time to inspect your tire's tread for wear. Also, proper tire pressure helps keep you rolling smoothly and safely. Expect your tires to drop at least 1 pound per square inch (psi) of pressure each month, no matter the weather. When

the air cools in the fall, that accelerates. Tires will drop another pound per square inch of pressure for every 10 degrees of temperature drop.

6. Dampness: Not only is hydroplaning a problem on wet roads but puddles can hide potholes and roadway corrosion making steering unreliable. Even before the puddles accumulate, rain can pool on the dust, grime, and oil that are on all roads and make the pavement slick.

7. Glare: The blinding distraction of sun glare waxes as summer wanes. In the Fall the sun moves closer to the horizon pointing it straight into your eyes and makes it more likely to reflect at low angles off buildings,

other cars, and windows. Keep your windshield clean, so dirt streaks don't contribute to the glare.

8. Fog and frost: Otherwise refreshing chilly autumn mornings can trigger fog, reducing your vision and distance perception. Using fog lights helps because they shine wide, low beams along the road and onto the edges of a street. Don't use them instead of your regular headlights, but in addition to low-beam headlights. Be mindful when temperatures have been cold enough that moisture on the road has turned to ice in spots. Pay special attention to bridges and overpasses where ice forms first on the roadway.

5 Reasons to Get Your Animal Licensed

Being a pet owner requires all sorts of responsibility. One that is often overlooked is registering your pet with your city government and getting them licensed. The American Humane Association indicates that 62% of U.S. households own a pet. Of those who have pets, 16% of them are estimated to be licensed. Failing to license your pet can hinder your chances of getting them back if they are picked up by the pound, and it can get you in trouble with the law.

If the above isn't reason enough for you to properly register your pets, here are a few more reasons why you should:

1. It is the law. In most states, it's mandatory that pet owners have their animals licensed. If you get caught without a license, which can and does happen, you will be hit with a hefty fine.

2. If your pet goes missing, having him licensed drastically improves your chances of getting him back. A license tag helps animal control and shelters quickly identify your pet and get him back to you safely. If your pet is found wandering the streets, a rescue organization can easily look up your pet via its license identifying number. Animals that are licensed tend to be kept at the shelter longer than unlicensed animals.

3. The cost of the license is far less than the penalty for being caught

without one. If a city official finds your pet without a license, you shall be guilty of a simple misdemeanor and, upon conviction, be subject to a fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment not to exceed 30 days.

4. Licensing lets people know that your pet is up to date on its rabies vaccinations. An animal cannot be licensed unless it is properly vaccinated. Animal control or a good samaritan will be more likely to handle and care for your missing pet if they know that it is healthy and rabies free.

5. License fees support the efforts of many local animal shelters. If you purchase your pet license at the Humane Society, half of the annual fee that you pay to license your pet goes to the shelter to help keep the shelter running.

Where to get your pet licensed

You may visit City Hall, purchase at the Humane Society, purchase from Midwest Pets for Life at their portable spay/neuter clinics, or you may apply for a license by mail.

What is required to get a license?

In order to apply for an animal license, you must provide a certificate showing that your pet is up to date with its rabies vaccinations.

Animals over four months and older must be licensed.

STREETS & SOLID WASTE DEPARTMENT

As a reminder when driving around town, we ask that you please use caution and slow down when approaching street crews in the roadway! Thank you!

Street Sweeping

With the fall season upon us, our crews will be street sweeping throughout town. Please do not rake leaves into the street as the debris clogs the catch basins and storm sewers (which can lead to backups). As with all our street crews, please slow down and use caution around the street sweepers. Street sweeping will continue until the leaves become frozen or covered with snow in the street.

§ 97.010 Dumping of Snow Ordinance

It is unlawful for any person to throw, push or place or cause to be thrown, pushed or placed, any ice or snow from private property, sidewalks or driveways onto the traveled way of a street or alley so as to obstruct gutters, or impede the passage of vehicles upon the street or alley or to create a hazardous condition therein; except where, in the cleaning of large commercial drives in the business district it is absolutely necessary to move the snow onto the street or alley temporarily, the accumulation shall be removed promptly by the property owner or agent. Arrangements for the prompt removal of the accumulations shall be made prior to moving the snow.

(Iowa Code § 364.12(2)) (1999 Code, § 135.10) Penalty, see § 10.99

§ 79.10 Calendar Parking Ordinance

(A) General provisions. Calendar parking shall be activated with the occurrence of a snow event, which is defined as the accumulation of one inch (1") or more of snow upon the public right-of-way.

(B) (1) During the period from November 15 through March 15, when a snow event has occurred, parking is restricted in the public right-of-way to alternate sides of the roadway in the following manner:

(a) On odd-numbered days, vehicles shall only be parked, stopped or left standing on that side of the roadway having odd-numbered addresses.

(b) On even-numbered days, vehicles shall only be parked, stopped or left standing on that side of the roadway having even-numbered addresses.

(2) A snow event will remain in effect for 24 hours after the snow has stopped.

(3) The hours for calendar parking will be from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. Vehicles will have three hours to be moved to the correct side of the roadway.

(4) The date at 6:00 a.m. shall determine if the day is odd or even.

(5) During a snow emergency, calendar parking shall be in effect except on designated snow routes where no parking will be permitted until the snow emergency has been cancelled.

(6) This section shall not apply to commercial districts where parking is designated on both sides of the street.

Snow Emergencies

When weather predictions call for a snowfall of 4 inches or more, or a comparable weather event, the City will declare a Snow Emergency. The City shall notify news and media outlets of the declared Snow Emergency along with the rules for parking and its duration.

Parking rules during a Snow Emergency are usually as follows:

"On posted Emergency Snow Routes, **please** remove all vehicles, if possible, by (a notified time). The Clinton Police Department will enforce the ticket and/or towing process. If vehicles are not removed, crews may only be able to clear a single path and possibly not be able to return to clear any more snow.

Please be aware that all Emergency Snow routes will be cleared first before crews begin to clear residential areas. Calendar Parking will be in effect."

Residential Street Light Outages

Many people are not aware that the majority of the street light outages in residential neighborhoods are not the responsibility of the City of Clinton. The City of Clinton is only responsible for the lighting and poles in the business corridors throughout town as well as the traffic signals. Street lights located in the residential areas of town are the responsibility of Alliant Energy. For any problems concerning residential street lights Alliant Energy prefers to be contacted by the homeowners directly. Listed below is the contact information for outages:

§ 50.27 Loading Ordinance

Vehicles or containers used for the collection and transportation of any solid waste shall be **loaded** and moved in a manner that the contents will not fall, leak or spill therefrom, and shall be **covered** to prevent blowing or loss of material. Where spillage does occur, the material shall be picked up immediately by the collector or transporter and returned to the vehicle or container and the area properly cleaned.



Solid Waste Department Information

Upcoming Garbage, Yard Waste and Recycling Delays:

Thanksgiving – Thursday, November 26th

There will be NO Garbage/Yard Waste/Recycling collections on Thursday, November 26th. Monday, November 23rd thru Wednesday, November 25th routes will be collected as normal. Thursday's route will be collected on Friday, November 27th and Friday's route will be collected on Saturday, November 28th.

Christmas – Friday, December 25th

Monday, December 21st thru Thursday, December 24th routes will be collected as normal. There will be NO Garbage/Recycling collections on Friday, December 25th. Friday's route will be collected on Saturday, December 26th.

New Year's – Friday, January 1st

Monday, December 28th thru Thursday, December 31st routes will be collected as normal. There will be NO Garbage/Recycling collections on Friday, January 1st. Friday's route will be collected on Saturday, January 2nd.

*There will be no delays in collections because of the Veteran's Day holiday.

Yard Waste Collections End for Winter

Yard Waste (green cart) collections will be **ending** for the year on **November 28th** (last week of November).

We will not extend collections beyond that date even if all the leaves have not fallen from the trees. Collection of the yard waste carts may be discontinued sooner if we receive a measurable snowfall before that date.

We discontinue yard waste collections during the winter because the cold temperatures cause the moisture contained in the leaves, grass, branches, etc. to freeze all of the material inside the cart. This prevents the material from coming out when we attempt to empty it, and in turn, will usually cause the cart to split or become damaged in some other way.

Solid Waste Collection Program

CART INFORMATION

- All City of Clinton collection carts are the property of the City.
- The City has 3 types of collection carts: Grey – garbage, Green – yard waste, and Blue – recycling.
- Collection carts are assigned to an address, not an individual (family). When ownership of a residence changes, each cart must stay at the address it is assigned to. Residents may cancel services at any time and all appropriate carts will be removed.
- Each resident is responsible for the proper care and security of the collection carts. The resident will be charged for replacing a cart should it become damaged or stolen as the result of improper care and/or not keeping the cart secured on the property.

COLLECTION INFORMATION

- All carts must be out by 7:00 am the day of collection.
- Garbage should be bagged in the grey cart.
- Yard waste should be placed loose in the green cart (no bags).
- Recycling should be placed loose in the blue cart (no bags).
- Carts will not be emptied if there is improper or incorrect material in the cart (such as garbage in a yard waste or recycling cart).
- Hot ashes should never be placed in the carts.
- Construction debris is not allowed in any of the carts.
- Toxic or hazardous waste is not allowed in any of the carts. This includes: electronics, pesticides, paint cans with paint, motor oils, sharps containers, flammable material, etc. (Contact the Clinton County Landfill at 563-243-4749 for any questions about acceptable material.)
- The maximum weight limit of the 95-gallon carts is 200 lbs.
- To avoid exceeding the weight limitation of the cart, or causing possible damage to the cart or collection vehicle, do not place rocks, concrete, bricks or dirt inside carts. Any items placed within the cart must fall out easily when the cart is being serviced. Please do not overfill or tightly pack items into the cart.
- Lids must be closed.
- Give adequate space between carts for collection by the automated trucks – 3 feet apart is optimal.
- Carts must be placed for collection away from homes, garages, fences, parked vehicles, utility poles, mailboxes, etc.
- Carts should not be placed higher than 1 foot above the surface that the collection truck is on.
- Carts should not be left at their collection spots past the collection day. Carts should be removed from the street or alley right-of-way and placed in a designated storage area on the resident's property. (This will prevent a possible road hazard, damage to the cart, or theft of the cart.)

Sharps Disposal

The City of Clinton **does not** collect and/or dispose of used sharps as they pose a potential threat to the Sanitation workers. However, residents may transport and dispose of sharps collected in an empty container similar to a laundry soap container (which has been labelled) and drop it off free of charge at the Clinton County Area Solid Waste Agency located at: 4292 220th St. – Clinton, IA 52732. 
